PROBICOU is engaged in a series of activities including: research, advocacy, awareness raising and promoting environmentally friendly technologies, Strengthening Sustainable Environment and Natural Resource Management, Climate Change Adaptation and Mitigation. PROBICOU is a critical advocate of environmental and natural resources issues. PROBICOU has Strengthened communities’ rights and participation in environmental conservation. PROBICOU has been an active party to the development of Natural Resources laws, policies, guidelines and regulations among others, key to these is the National Climate Change policy. PROBICOU is a fund managing agent for and project implementing partner with Civil Society Coalition on Indigenous Peoples in Uganda (CSCIPU). PROBICOU successfully implemented FCPF capacity building project under the framework of Civil Society Coalition on Indigenous Peoples in Uganda. MPIDO provided technical support and the funds (\$48,600) from Forest Carbon Partnership Facility (FCPF) under the World Bank (WB) towards Capacity Building project that empowered indigenous peoples in Uganda to actively engage and participate in REDD+ processes in Uganda (readiness and implementation

## **2.0 SUB-PROJECT SUMMARY**

**Brief overview of the applicant's sub-project (Goal, Objectives and Results) (Maximum 500 Words)**

This is a follow up project for the previous project titled “*Building the capacity of indigenous people to actively engage and participate in REDD+ processes in Uganda (readiness and implementation)*” The current project will focus on Capacity Building of Indigenous Peoples in Policy Development and Engagement with Local and National REDD+ Actors” is aimed at implementing activities that increase the understanding of forest-dependent Indigenous Peoples of the national REDD+ Strategy, related laws, pilot areas and implications related to the implementation of the Uganda National REDD+ Strategy; widen the engagement of relevant indigenous peoples institutions and stakeholders in the REDD+ process, World Bank safeguards, and have a strong gender and human rights focus with emphasis on IP women and youths. The project activities will include capacity-building workshops, reviews and analysis of legal, policy documents, consultative meetings and awareness raising forums. The sub-project beneficiaries are the underserved forest-dependent IP communities with a priority focus on the Albertine Region and Mt Elgon Regions. The activities will draw representation from other IP regions such as Karamoja Region. All Actions and activities will be conducted in culturally appropriate languages respecting the rights, of targeted forest-dependent IPs such as free, prior and informed in line with the World Bank Operational Policy on Indigenous Peoples, OP 4.10. The project will improve indigenous peoples understanding of both international and domestic policies governing REDD+. The participation and involvement of forest dependent indigenous people’s policymaking will increase. The project will also improve the collaboration between Civil Society Coalition on Indigenous Peoples and other stakeholders working in the area of indigenous peoples.

### 3.0 PROBLEM ANALYSIS AND STATEMENT

***Explain the problem the sub-project intends to address and the anticipated changes to the broader community (Maximum 500 words)***

Traditional indigenous lands and territories are very important to achieving sustainable utilization of global environment resources. Rich in natural resources, traditional indigenous lands and territories contain up to 80 percent of the planet's biodiversity. In addition, Indigenous Peoples are among the most threatened by the impacts of climate change and global development due to their limited capacity to defend their rights, and interests in land territories, natural and cultural resources and may restrict their ability to participate in and benefit from development initiatives and climate change actions. In many cases, they don't receive equitable access to project benefits or benefits are not devised or delivered in a form that is culturally appropriate. Indigenous people are not always adequately consulted about the design or implementation of activities which would profoundly affect their lives or communities. Indigenous Peoples make valuable contributions to the world's heritage due to their in-depth, varied and locally rooted traditional knowledge and their understanding of ecosystem management. They are the most economically marginalized and vulnerable segments of the population. Legal and policy documents and instruments such as the environmental and social safeguards (ESS) and the environmental and social management standard (ESMS), reflect the importance of fully and effectively engaging with indigenous peoples in the design, development and implementation of the strategies and activities, while respecting their rights. However, these are seldom implemented and or enforced. The importance of engaging with indigenous peoples in climate change policies and actions has been recognized by the Conference of the Parties (COP) to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC), including in the Cancun Agreement (decision 1/CP.16). There is need to strengthen capacity and efforts of local communities and indigenous peoples related to addressing and responding to climate change. This calls for integration of the indigenous and traditional knowledge and practices into adaptation planning and practices, and to engage them in the procedures for monitoring, evaluation and reporting and actions for developing and or reviewing of legal and policy instruments which affect them. Such actions will help to avoid any adverse impacts activities may have on indigenous peoples' rights, interests and well-being, and to minimize, mitigate and/or compensate appropriately and equitably for such impacts, in a consistent way and to improve community livelihoods and other outcomes. The intervention will enable the active participation of indigenous peoples in ensuring more effective, sustainable and equitable climate change results, outcomes and impacts and to enable them to be active leaders and participants in the process.

#### 4.0 PROJECT GOAL AND OBJECTIVES

The goal is to increase the participation of Indigenous People and Local Communities in the development of legal, strategic, policy processes related to REDD+

The specific objectives include: -

1. To promote the participation of Indigenous People and Local Communities in the development of REDD+ related laws, policies, regulations and guidelines
2. To engage National and sub-national structures and actors engaged in the implementation of REDD+ Actions and Processes in targeted meetings, and forums regarding tangible strategies.
3. To disseminate information regarding the implementation of REDD+ actions, processes, strategies, policies, Indigenous Traditional Knowledge, gender and Human rights

#### 5.0 SUB-PROJECT BENEFICIARIES

**Please provide the estimated total number of beneficiaries (Disintegrated data – Women, Men and Youth) who will directly benefit from the sub-project (Maximum 100 words)**

The direct beneficiaries shall be the at least 1750 forest dependent Indigenous peoples including youth, women and men, who are expected to benefit from capacity building and training in policy development and knowledge sharing meetings. These include 40% women (18-59 yrs.), 25% youths (18-35yrs), 25% men (18-59yrs), and 10% elderly and persons living with disabilities. Other beneficiaries shall be policy makers at the District Local Government Level (DLG), representatives of central government and members of civil society organizations. The other beneficiaries will number 250. These are critical to realizing direct beneficiaries' active participation in REDD+ actions and processes.

## 6.0 SUB-PROJECT ACTIVITIES

The specific activities under each of the objectives include:

- 1. Promote the participation of Indigenous Peoples and Local Communities in the development of REDD+ related laws, policies, regulations and guidelines**
  - i. Review policies related to REDD+, Indigenous Peoples' rights to, and interests in, land, territories and natural and cultural resources and climate change in Uganda through documents reviews, consultations and interviews.
  - ii. Conduct two (one day) meetings with policy makers and leaders at national level
  - iii. Conduct one (two day) capacity building workshop on policy development targeting Indigenous Peoples' leaders.
- 2. Engage National and sub-national structures and actors engaged in the implementation of REDD+ Actions and Processes in targeted meetings, forums regarding tangible strategies.**
  - i. Conduct one (one day) National and sub-national stakeholders' meeting on existing REDD+ strategies.
  - ii. Hold one (one day) meeting with the committee set up by the Prime Minister's Office to consider and input views in the Document on indigenous peoples' needs and opportunities.
  - iii. Conduct two (one day) sub-national meetings for sub-national actors involved in the implementation of REDD+ actions and processes, gender and human rights issues
  - iv. Conduct one (one day) participatory review workshop for lesson learning, knowledge sharing and validation of the outcomes of the sub-project tasks.
  - v. Hold two sub-national gender event targeting the civil society, local government and IPs
- 3. Disseminate information regarding the implementation of REDD+ actions, processes, strategies, policies, Indigenous Traditional Knowledge, gender and human rights issues.**
  - i. Conduct four radio talk shows (including two on the role of IP women in REDD+ and the disadvantages they face)
  - ii. Develop Curriculum Contents on Indigenous Peoples and REDD+ participation to be conveyed to the public through FM radio stations, SMSs, Songs and participatory video
  - iii. Publish and disseminate 500 copies of knowledge products of the first phase of the project eg the National IP survey report, policy briefs.
  - iv. Design and produce 500 booklets on Indigenous Peoples Traditional Knowledge(ITK) issues
  - v. Produce 500 of Sub-project activity reports

## 7.0 SUB-PROJECT OUTCOME RESULTS

### **Results under Objective 1,**

Increased participation of Indigenous Peoples in the development of REDD+ related laws, policies, regulations and guidelines done with their views captured. Indigenous people's views incorporated in REDD+ policies.

### **Results under Objective 2.**

National and sub-national structures and actors engaged in the implementation of REDD+ Actions and Processes. The intermediate results into (i) identifying Gaps and opportunities existing with REDD+ implementation process (ii) Making a roadmap for participation of indigenous peoples in REDD+ and other Process (iii) Views collected from the committee set up by the Prime Minister's Office on indigenous peoples' needs and opportunities (iii) gender and human rights identified and captured to inclusion in policy documents and laws(iv) a multi stake holder committee formed to follow up on indigenous peoples inclusion on policies and laws affecting IPs participation in REDD+ and other processes.

### **Results under objective 3.**

Indigenous people's issues mainstreamed in the policies, laws and strategies for REDD+ as a means for recognition as important forest stakeholders for use, control and management of forest resources; rights to land tenure; and improved equitable sharing of benefits. Policies will be reviewed and comments generated. The intermediate results of the activity will include; production of survey reports, booklets on ITK, policy and law briefs, End of Sub-project activity reports of on lessons learnt which will then enable information sharing and dissemination of research results to policy makers to inform policy reviews It is also expected to result into *Increased access* to information on REDD+, and climate change policy implementation; and *ii) increased Education, and awareness* on strategies to increase participation of indigenous people.

The key results are (i) Increased awareness and adept skills of trainers on rights of indigenous in implementation of REDD+ initiatives (ii) Increased and strengthened coordination mechanisms/strategies for increased participation on indigenous people in the design and implementation of REDD+ Initiatives in Uganda (iii) Indigenous peoples' views and issues and rights integrated in laws, policies and regulations for management of natural resources like land, and forests. (iv) Action Plans on implementation of strategies to increase IPs participation (v) Increased participation of IP women in policy making and awareness on their rights.

- iii. Number of research papers/policy briefs produced/published and disseminated or distributed by end of the project;
- iv. Number of stakeholders requesting and accessing indigenous people's information and plans, analysis, and decision support tools as a result of this particular project; Number of climate change projects developed with budgets allocated to indigenous peoples
- v. Number of Indigenous Peoples, youth and women willing to pilot new appropriate REDD+ initiatives in the project regions in Uganda.
- vi. Number of Indigenous Peoples, youth and women assuming key leadership positions and participating in REDD+ processes at National, Level and Global level. Number and frequency of stories being published in both print and electronic media about indigenous people and REDD+

The data about these indicators will be collected using activity records, district records and documents, interviews, media and talk show recordings, and testimonies.



## 9.0 SUB-PROJECT SUSTAINABILITY

**Demonstrate how the sub-project will maintain its operations, services and benefits during its projected lifetime even after funding ends (Maximum 500 words)**

Apart from PROBICOU's and CSCIPU's presence in the sub-project area and the goodwill of forest dependent Indigenous Peoples' communities we work with, our sub-project will seek the endorsement of local and religious leaders and relevant government authorities and agencies. PROBICOU shall directly engage all key stakeholders in the sub-project. This will create a sense of ownership and sustainability of all the activities conducted in the sub- PROBICOU sub-project.

The sub-project's success and sustainability will be based on the application of the efficiently proven implementation approaches and the availability of resources such as qualified, experienced and committed personnel, and equipment. The sub-project is in line with Conference of the Parties (COP) to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC), including in the Cancun Agreement (decision 1/CP.16). It is required in these legal frameworks that local communities are involved in the preparation and management of sub-project plans and their roles to be well stipulated in those plans. The project is also in line with International Treaties which require each member country to embrace the principles of sustainable natural resource management. The project will strengthen the indigenous peoples' coalition steering committee, which provides an opportunity to further manage the key aspects of the sub-project and the established conservation related enterprises after official project closure. The initiatives and linkages created by this project are expected to generate some income that will sustain the management of the project. Critical to the sub-project sustainability are:

- i. Financial leverage during project implementation. The project will collaborate with other institutions working on related REDD+ issues such as IUCN, Environmental Alert, government (National REDD+ Secretariat) and other stake to access communication materials, joint activities information sharing and mobilization.
- ii. Knowledge generation, management and dissemination.
- iii. Public awareness and dissemination /Lesson learning
- iv. Number of women and youth engaged and active participating on REDD+ processes at local, national and regional levels.

The sub-project staff will plan, implement, monitor and evaluate the project's activities as well as network and managing resources to perpetuate their existence. The expected inputs will be managed and put to proper use, hence leaving a lasting impact on the beneficiaries and communities. A spirit of community participation shall be maintained in order to sustain the project under the framework of service demand.

The sub-project has inbuilt project sustainability including developing new partnerships, online fundraising, in-kind donations and involving key stakeholders and establish multi-stakeholder committee to follow up on the project outcomes. The strengthening and use of existing community structures is expected to establish a strong institutional framework that would support sustainability. Beneficiaries and stakeholders would be prepared from the outset for the post-project engagement period through effective training and advisory services

## 10.0 SUB-PROJECT MONITORING AND EVALUATION

Sub-Project monitoring, evaluation and lesson learning will be undertaken to:

- a. Develop a Sub-Project Performance and Management System (PPMS) to be applied throughout the sub-project duration and;
- b. Undertake sub-project monitoring and evaluation at regular intervals and report to the stakeholders.

The monitoring and evaluation of this sub-project aims at achieving projected results. Activity monitoring will take place as project interventions occur. The mid-term review and the evaluation scheduled by the end of the sixth month will measure progress against objectives, purpose and goal

The mechanism for Monitoring and Evaluation will include:

**1. Activity monitoring:** all sub-project activities will be monitored on a regular basis based on the expected outcomes.

**2. Mid Term Review:** This process will take place during the fifth month of the sub-project. It will assess progress towards component objectives, achievements against the indicators and to examine early sub-project impacts.

**3. Final Evaluation:** a final evaluation of the sub-project activities and outputs will take place in the twelfth month of the project life. The evaluation will assess project achievement against objectives and purpose indicators. It will look at the final impact of the project in terms of significant or lasting changes on the forest dependent indigenous peoples, other target groups and the indirect beneficiaries brought about at least in part, by the sub-project's activities. Special attention will be paid to the degree to which knowledge of REDD+ National Strategy and other related policies and laws, environmental conservation and climate change concepts and best practices have been integrated into the REDD+ actions and processes especially as regards the Indigenous Peoples.

**4. Reporting:** Regular reports will be prepared according to the Donor's standard format and timeframe (both narrative and financial). In each stage the data will be gender desegregated.

**5. Project Review and Adjustment:** the sub-project will be reviewed every three months to draw lessons and necessary adjustment of activities. During these reviews the sub-project staff will consider the questions:

- Whether the project is on track and achieving the objectives?
- Whether there is need to do things differently?"

The outcomes may result in making changes to activities.

**6. The M&E process:** The process will enable sub-project staff, collaborating partners and beneficiaries to learn, share their experiences and review what has gone well – and why – and where problems have occurred. The Sub-Project Coordinator will lead others in ensuring that emerging lessons and interesting results are pursued and documented on a continuous basis in order to close any gaps realized on time. Sub-Project staff and collaborating partners will attend Multi-stakeholder platform meetings on the status of REDD+ National Strategy, REDD+ actions and implementation related policies, laws, regulations and treaties among others. In these events we will describe lessons learnt and drawn from Sub-project achievements. Learning will be used immediately if we need to make changes to project implementation to secure the Outcome. The partners will use all experience and learning gained from the sub-project to build their capacity. The learning process is anticipated to have a major impact on indigenous people's participation in the REDD+ actions and processes, their rights and benefits and on the future work.

## 11.0 SUB-PROJECT MANAGEMENT TEAM

The project will be implemented under the framework of Civil Society Coalition on Indigenous Peoples in Uganda (CSCIPU). PROBICOU as a fund managing agent for CSCIPU shall be the principal recipient of funds and shall lead and coordinate the implementation of project activities. The activities shall be executed by CSCIPU. There shall be a project management committee which will play an oversight function and overall quality control for the project. The project committee shall be composed of five members comprising of 1 Executive committee member of CSCIPU, 1 representative of indigenous peoples, 1 representative from Uganda government (REDD Focal Point person) 1 representative from PROBICOU and project Manager
